

Tracking Templeton grantees down their progress paths

Global perspectives on science and spirituality

The Global Perspectives on Science and Spirituality program has received the first of its grant proposals to build on the science-and-religion dialogue begun with the Local Societies Initiative in Bratislava, Slovakia.

Members of the society visited universities in India and Romania and said they were pleased to receive promising applications from organizations including the M.S. Swaminathan Research Foundation in Chennai, India.

According to program manager Tom Mackenzie, the society will face challenges when seeking applications in Central Europe and Asia because, he said, "For many countries, the idea of doing a research program on science and spirituality is new and somewhat unusual."

Mackenzie hopes each research group will consist of one scientist and one theologian or philosopher who will collaborate on the project.

Monetary support will include reimbursement sufficient to release the grantee from one year of responsibilities and additional stipends for research and travel expenses. After primary selections are made, remaining applicants will submit final applications for consideration.
